

United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) – Facts

People without a home typically die about 30 years earlier; higher rates of acute and chronic conditions

50% of people are 1 paycheck away from homelessness, 1 crisis away – medical emergency or automobile accident

40-60% of people experiencing homelessness have a job

People with minimum wage jobs must work 86 hours a week to afford a 1-bedroom unit

Only 37 affordable homes are available for every 100 extremely low-income renters (NM 32-40k shortage, per MFA strategic plan in 2021)

70% of the lowest wage households spend half their income on rent

Every \$100 increase in median rent is associated with a 9% rise in homelessness

Housing Programming Overall

- Housing resources can be a very complex field to navigate. NM has various stakeholders and various programs.
- The fund source dictates the definition of homelessness, program eligibility criteria and processes for these programs.
- NM Mortgage Finance Authority, state housing authority and quasi-governmental agency, receives Emergency Solution Grant (ESG) funding from US Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD. MFA's ESG funding Emergency Housing Assistance Program (EHAP) supports for homeless shelters.

- The NM Coalition to End Homelessness (NMCEH), non-profit agency, receives Continuum of Care/Balance of State funding from HUD for permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, and rental assistance. NMCEH has an application process for providers.
- NM State Departments utilize funding (SGF or federal grants) for programming
 - ▶ PED utilizes McKinney Vento funding and support homeless liaisons in schools
 - ▶ CYFD funds Transitions supportive housing programming and vouchers.
 - HCA (Formerly HSD)
 - ▶ DWS Office of Housing & Production
- Municipalities/Localities City or County



Behavioral Health Services Division – Health Care Authority

- ▶ BHSD oversees several supportive housing and housing assistance programs.
- Significant and fast growth to funding and programs in most recent years.
 - ▶ Budget has increased dramatically since FY19 \$3.4M, FY24 & FY25 \$12M, FY26 over \$16M.
- Programs are funded and supported with State General Funds and federal grants (2), PATH and Opening Doors.
- In SFY2025, the supportive housing budget was over \$12.2M with over \$11M SGF.
- FY23 54 contracts with 28 providers; 13 programs areas
- ► FY24 & FY25- 65 contracts, 35+ providers and new programming.
- ► FY26 69 contracts, 35+ providers, 15 program areas

Programs Supported Federal Funds

PATH – SAMHSA formula grant that focuses on outreach and connection to services. Homeless individuals with SMI/co-occurring are screened and enrolled.

What is Supportive Housing?

- **Subsidized rental housing** affordable to the lowest levels of income (at or below 30% Area Median Income)
- Linked with flexible supportive services to support tenancy and address other needs
- A SAMHSA evidence-based practice for recovery and resiliency
 - (Tenant must be the <u>lease holder</u>)

Linkages Permanent Supportive Housing Program

- Program created in 2007 with an initial State General Fund Legislative Allocation of \$300,000
- Began in Three Sites/65 Vouchers
 - Santa Fe
 - Albuquerque
 - Silver City/Deming
- o Joint Venture:
 - Health Care Authority/Behavioral Health Services Division manages the Support Service Agency (SSA) providers.
 - Mortgage Finance Authority manages the Housing Administrators (HAs) responsible for vouchers.
 - o BHSD contracts with MFA who subcontracts with housing administrators.

Linkages Supportive Housing Program

State General Funds continue to support the Linkages Program, and funding has since 2007 increased from \$300k to over \$5.3 million in SFY2024, \$6.2M in SFY2025 and over \$10M in SFY2026

Funding increased significantly from \$1.7M to \$3.8M in SFY2021, which allowed for two additional sites and voucher capacity increases for all existing sites. 180 to 318 voucher capacity.

SFY2023 (\$500k) & SFY2024 (\$1M) also had increased funding. Increases supported higher allowance for rent and hotel/motel vouchers and increase to voucher capacity. 396

FY25 – Linkages funds support furniture stipends.

FY26 – 553 vouchers; 11 sites

Linkages Supportive Housing Program

Eligible individuals receive a rental assistance voucher and support services, monthly house visit.

Program Eligibility

- ▶ Diagnosis of Serious Mental Illness; or, Co-occurring (SMI and Substance Use Disorder), which has resulted in a functional impairment, and.
- ► Homelessness or precariously housed, <u>and</u>
- ► Extremely low income, at or below 30% AMI, per HUD guidelines
- ► FY24 396 Voucher Capacity statewide
- ► FY26 553 Voucher Capacity statewide

Step | Services Provider Role

Phase A: Eligibility, Referral of Linkages Applicant

- Client In reach/Outreach to individuals with SMI and experiencing homelessness
- Determines & Certifies consumer eligibility
- Refers /Accompanies consumer to Housing Administrator with documentation

Phase B: After Linkages Client Voucher Issuance

- Assist /Accompany consumer with housing search and move in
- Assist consumer with hotel/motel stay during housing search, if necessary.
- Assist consumer with move-in and orient to lease & property rules
- Provides support services and eviction prevention as needed
- Conducts monthly home visits required
- Liaison with property manager regarding tenant-landlord relations



Special Needs or Set Aside Housing Program (SAHP)

- ▶ SAHP is a permanent supportive housing program.
- What is a Special Needs/Set Aside Housing Unit?
 - A housing unit in a designated LIHTC (Low Income Housing Tax Credit) property that has been set aside or prioritized for a qualified special needs consumer
- ► There are 372 Special Needs units set aside in forty-five (43) housing projects/properties located in nineteen (19) New Mexico counties and Native American tribal lands.
- ▶ Local Lead Agencies (LLAs) screen for eligibility criteria. 12 LLAs Statewide.

Special Needs/Set Aside Housing Program Eligibility

Who is Eligible? Applicant must have household income at or below 60% of area median income for the County:

<u>and</u>

Household must meet one of these target populations:

homeless or precariously housed individual or family physical disabilities developmental disabilities

chronic mental illness

substance use disorder

sensory or cognitive disability

disability caused by chronic illness

age-related disability (i.e., frail elderly, or, young adult with other special needs

who have been in the foster care or juvenile justice services system)

and

Applicant must also have a selected Support Service Provider:

Assist with the SN application process

Commits to provide ongoing services

Commits to conduct monthly home visits

Local Lead Agencies

- Screen for eligibility of SAHP and maintain waiting list.
- Liaison with support service agencies, property managers, and tenant.

Fresh Start Rental Assistance





For persons (may be adult or other family member) diagnosed with Serious Mental Illness or Severe Emotional Disturbance (minor) who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

*Eligible individual must be active in service.

Provides eligible recipients a \$1,000.00 grant every three (3) years for expenses related to moving into housing or preventing eviction (rent, utilities, deposits, etc.)

BHSD Crisis (Respite) Housing Program

Provides **transitional housing up to <u>120-days</u> for individuals** who meet <u>all three</u> criteria:

- diagnosed with serious mental illness
- being discharged from psychiatric centers, hospitals, jails or other institutional settings, and,
- have no imminent housing available and would otherwise become homeless

Program helps to stabilize the client; assist them to find employment; have income entitlements reinstated; and find permanent housing.

Program Locations:

Amador Health Center-- Las Cruces and Dona Ana County

Oxford House™ New Mexico Program

- Nationally recognized Recovery housing program for persons with alcohol use or substance use disorders
- Congregate housing in a structured living environment with peer support to achieve behavior change without relapses
- Democratically run, self-supporting and drug-free houses for either male or female clients
- Residents may participate in Medical Assisted Treatment (MAT) programs for addiction
- Oxford Houses are (19) located in Albuquerque, Las Cruces, and Farmington

SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access, and Recovery (SOAR)

- BHSD began funding SOAR providers in FY21, per legislative process.
- SSI/SSDI Outreach, Access and Recovery (SOAR) is a model developed by SAMHSA to assist SSI/SSDI eligible individuals navigate the difficult process of obtaining an approval for disability income benefits administered by the Social Security Administration.
- ▶ SOAR allows increased access to Social Security disability benefits for eligible individuals who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness, have a serious mental illness, medical impairment, and/or co-occurring substance use disorder.
- Providers Albuquerque Health Care for the Homeless; Heading Home; Hidalgo Medical Services (Main); Mesilla Valley Community of Hope; St. Luke's Health Care Clinics, Inc.

Fresh Start Rental Assistance

- NM Attorney General reached a settlement with CVS, Albertsons, and Wal Mart regarding reaping of profits from addictive opioids
- ▶ \$6.5M to BHSD; \$2M to housing
- Fresh Start Rental Assistance program new
- Request for Application process in September 2023
- Providers selected and contracts signed in November 2023; programming began in December 2023.


Fresh Start Rental Assistance

Providers: Serenity Mesa, NM Re-Entry Center; YDI; Mental Health Resources; Carlsbad Lifehouse, Mesilla Valley Community of Hope; Espanola Pathways Shelter, Dreamtree; SPIN

Providers are be able to assist an eligible individual with up to \$10,000 of rental assistance or 6-9 months rent

Eligibility criteria: Opioid Use Disorder (OUD); homeless/precariously housed; active in recovery or behavioral health services; at or below 60% AMI.


FRESH STARTRENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM



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Fresh Start Rental Assistance

- FY25 Funding was supplemented with additional with \$2.4M expended
- Since the inception of the program 342 unduplicated clients have been served
- FY26 \$2.5M allocated to support the program



Fresh Start Rental Assistance

- ► Each eligible individual has a Housing Stability plan to ensure continued success.
- Policy updates since FSRA program began:
 - ► Furniture Stipends allowed for individuals eligible for rental assistance up to \$1,000, per client.
 - ▶ Support may now extend to 9 months but within the \$10k allowable amount; initially support was 6 months.
 - ▶ Outcomes data will be gathered at 6 months and provide clients with a \$25 stipend.
