The 2025 Indian Health Service (IHS) National Clinical and Community Workforce Summit is a premier opportunity to assemble and hear from nationally recognized speakers, health care providers, Tribal leaders, and health care officials committed to addressing emergent clinical and community health topics in Indian Country. The summit will highlight program successes and best and promising practices while providing professional development, collaboration, and networking opportunities.

Your hosts for the event will be the IHS Division of Clinical and Community Services (DCCS) team within the Office of Clinical and Preventive Services. The DCCS serves as a source of national advocacy, management, policy development, and coordination of comprehensive clinical, preventive, and community-based programs. DCCS uses a public health approach to focus on the following areas: cancer prevention, elder health, emergency medical services, health education, health promotion and disease prevention, health records, hepatitis C prevention and surveillance, HIV/ AIDS, medical services, men's health, and pharmacy for American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/ AN) people. Working with Tribes, Tribal organizations, Urban Indian health organizations, and in other partnerships, DCCS coordinates national efforts to improve the quality of care, support patient safety, build capacity, and improve access to care by developing and implementing evidence-based, practice-based, and culturally-based activities in Indian Country.

- Employ culturally grounded principles and innovative approaches to care and services for AI/AN communities.

Target Audience:

Healthcare teams from IHS, Tribal, and Urban programs, community health providers, and clinicians (Physicians, Nurses, Pharmacists, Social Workers, Psychologists, and all other disciplines).

Guidelines for Continuing Education Credit:


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
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
