


What is the Pacific Sustainable Tourism Policy Framework?

- Informs monitoring and evaluation of regional progress


Why the PSTPF Matters

Challenges

- 1. Tourism is not a priority sector when it comes to national investment across the region
- 2. Funding and Human Resources for implementation
- 3. Monitoring of Progress is hindered by Data gaps
- 4. Competing donor priorities, not favouring tourism
- 5. Varying capacity and capability of destinations in the region
- 6. Alignment of national and regional priorities



Successes/Highlights

- High level commitment and Political will across the region
- Global recognition of the Pacific's journey in advancing sustainable tourism
- PSTPF gaining Commonwealth Secretary General's 2023 Award for Partnerships for Promoting Sustainable Development
- The PSTPF has become an overarching framework for national development
- Positioning of SPTO as regional leader in sustainable tourism





Lessons Learnt

Sustainable and Responsible Tourism will:

- 1. Require collaboration across government, with private sector, NGOs and partners
- 1. Communities need to be at the center of tourism policy and programme development
- 1. Governance of the sector and supporting entities need strengthening through targeted support
- 1. Capacity development for the sector require ongoing support
- 1. Tourism must be integrated across Government programmes
