Welcome: We are glad everyone is here. We focus on three things: connecting with God, connecting with each other, and serving our world. In other words, this group does not exist for us.

Before we introduce ourselves, let's remember:

- This is a safe place to grow spiritually.
- We are a wide diversity of Truth seekers. We are glad all of you are here.
- You will notice we do not use a bunch of fancy religious language.
- We do not try to impress people with how much Bible quoting we can do. We are common people.
- Please be sensitive so everyone has an opportunity to share and contribute.
- Cell phones should be put on "vibrate," or turned off.

Check-In:

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a high-light or a low-light (a headline) from your week?
- 3. [Insert rotation question for the week.]

Rotation Questions: Rotate through the following three questions:

Week 1: How would you like to simplify your life?

Week 2: How would you like to re-prioritize your life?

Week 3: How would you like to cultivate a deeper relationship with God.

Week 4: How would you like to simplify your life?

Week 5: etc.

At the end of check-in ask the person who facilitated to choose another adult to facilitate check-in next week. Anyone can facilitate check-in. It does not have to be a CORE leader.

Children's Check-In Questions: How did you help Mommy or Daddy this week? (Or they can answer the adult questions.)

The Quiz: A child asks three questions. They randomly choose from the check-in questions people just answered. Ask everyone to raise their hands and the child picks someone to answer the questions.

For example:

- 1. What was his (pointing to the person) high-light for the week?
- 2. What was her name (pointing to the person)?
- 3. How did she want to simplify her life?

At the end of the quiz ask the child who facilitated to choose another child to facilitate the quiz next week.

This is what page 2 of a typical leader's guide for a given week actually looks like.

Facilitator's Directions:

- 1. Talk as little as possible, encourage others to share, and avoid a monologue.
- 2. Cut on the dotted lines. Distribute questions around the circle. (* -------)
- 3. Keep this top part and the bottom part (question D) of this page.
- 4. Reassure people they do not have to answer the questions, just read it for us.
- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first):

Bridge: This transitions the group form the Kick-off Question into the Bible story.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Bible story reference will be listed here. (*Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible during our discussion.*)

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

Some helpful pointers for digging questions:

- Remember: there are no "right answers" to relational Bible study questions. Help people contribute their perspective to the dialogue.
- You DO NOT have to "accomplish" all the questions listed. Use them as a resource from which to select during your discussion.

- Spend a maximum of 50% of your Bible study time on these questions.
- Affirm each answer, no matter what is said, by saying something like, "Excellent, someone else"; "Thanks for sharing, someone else"; "Good, someone else"; "How about the rest of you, what do you think".
- Did you catch the common denominator, "someone else"? You are always affirming and always inviting others to give input.
- If someone gets off-focus, simply say (after they have stopped talking), "What was the question? Let's read it again."

Sharing Questions (50% of your study time):

Some helpful pointers:

- Spend a minimum of 50% of your time on these questions.
- These questions are designed to invite people to share portions of their life story as it interacts with the Bible study.
- At appropriate times affirm confidentiality and offer reassurance that this is a safe place to share and grow spiritually.

Group Prayer:

- 1. We are blessed by being a part of this group, yet it exists for those who are not yet here.
- 2. Put an Empty Chair in the middle of your prayer circle. Pray for the people who are not yet here.
- 3. Close by saying the Blessing Board blessing together.

At the end of prayer, ask the person who facilitated to choose another adult to facilitate the questions for next week. Anyone can facilitate the questions. It does not have to be a CORE leader.

Lunch:

- 1. Keep it simple. Keep it easily reproducible.
- 2. Hostess (one of the CORE4) provides the beans.
- 3. During lunch have the Taco Salad Sign-up Sheet available.

Two Promises – One Job

outline

Acts 1:1-11

Message of Hope: Jesus promises to come back, and while we wait, He promises to send the Holy Spirit to help us.

The Basic 8 Simple Church Tools: Collection Box, Connection Card Envelopes, Business Cards, Taco Salad Sign-up Sheet, A variety of extra Bible translations, Child Safety Poster, Blessing Board, Summary Form (which is emailed to the Details Coordinator every Sunday).

Breakfast

Welcome: We are so glad that you are here today.

Setting the Context:

- We come from a variety of backgrounds and seek to create a safe place for Truth seekers to grow spiritually.
- You will notice that we try to avoid fancy religious language. We are common people.
- Let's encourage those who like to talk to give opportunity for everyone to participate.

Check-In:

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a high-light or a low-light (a headline) from your week?
- 3. [Insert rotation question for the week.]

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- 4. Reassure people they do not have to answer the questions, just read it for us.
- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): When you hear the word "promise" what comes to your mind?

Bridge: Today's story contains two promises that have given hope, courage, and comfort to millions of people around the world. Both of these promises have also provided protection from some of Satan's most deceptive lies. So, let's read our story.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 1:1-11

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- What do you see as some of the most important themes the author is introducing in the first five verses of Acts? Why do you think they are important?
- Let's pause and read verse 3 again. How do you think the disciples are able to know for sure that when Jesus appears to them it is not Satan deceiving them by pretending to be Jesus?
- Let's pause and read verses 4-5 again. What do you think is the difference between being baptized with water and being baptized with the Holy Spirit?
- 4. If you were to summarize Dr. Luke's primary reason for the Holy Spirit being given, how would you summarize it from this story?

Sharing Questions (50% of your study time):

- A. On a personal note, if you had been among the disciples when Jesus appeared to them during the forty days, what questions would have been at the top of your list to ask Him?
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- B. Which of these two promises, 1) the promise of the Holy Spirit being given or 2) the promise of Jesus' return, brings more hope, courage, and comfort to you at this time in your life? Why?

- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?
- D. Remember: Jesus promises to come back, and while we wait, He promises to send the Holy Spirit to help us. How can this group pray for you this week?

Acts 1:12-26

Message of Hope: God can use you, no matter what your background has been, to help mentor others spiritually.

The Basic 8 Simple Church Tools: Collection Box, Connection Card Envelopes, Business Cards, Taco Salad Sign-up Sheet, A variety of extra Bible translations, Child Safety Poster, Blessing Board, Summary Form (which is emailed to the Details Coordinator every Sunday).

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Check-In:

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a high-light or a low-light (a headline) from your week?
- 3. [Insert rotation question for the week.]

At the end of check-in ask the person who facilitated to choose another adult to facilitate check-in next week. Anyone can facilitate check-in. It does not have to be a CORE leader.

Children's Check-In Questions: How did you help Mommy or Daddy this week? (Or they can answer the adult questions.)

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- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): How long does it take you or your family to get out the door once you have decided to go somewhere?

Bridge: Today's story is kind of a sad story, yet it provides some wisdom on how we can patiently wait for God's leading by praying together and working together. Our story is called *Gearing to Go*.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 1:12-26

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

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Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

1. Let's pause and read verse 14 again. What footnotes or cross references does your Bible have regarding who these women might be?

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2. In a male-controlled culture, Dr. Luke, both in his gospel called the book of *Luke* and here in the book of *Acts*, intentionally highlights women and their participation in the early church. Why do you think he goes against the tide in doing this?

3. Someone read verses 20-21 again. Peter is quoting from the Old Testament. Let's find these verses and read them from Psalms.

Let's pause and read verses 23 and 26 again. Both are part of the selection process. How do you think these two steps complement each other?

Sharing Questions (50% of your study time):

- A. On a personal note, how do you go about making important decisions? [∞] ------
- B. Who is someone God has used to mentor your spiritual growth?
- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?
- D. Remember: God can use you, no matter what your background, to mentor others spiritually. How can this group pray for you this week?

Group Prayer:

- Put **Empty Chairs** in the middle of your circle. Pray for people who will be invited.
- Close by saying the **Blessing Board** blessing together.

Acts 2:1-13

Message of Hope: The Holy Spirit is given to all who believe: male, female, child, and adult.

The Basic 8 Simple Church Tools: Collection Box, Connection Card Envelopes, Business Cards, Taco Salad Sign-up Sheet, A variety of extra Bible translations, Child Safety Poster, Blessing Board, Summary Form (which is emailed to the Details Coordinator every Sunday).

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Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): What is one, two, or a few words you know in another language? Let's go around the circle and if you know a word, say it and tell us what language it comes from.

Bridge: Anyone who has tried to learn a second language knows how hard it can be. Today's story showcases some people who become fluent in another language in a matter of seconds. But more important than the "how" is the "Who." So, let's read the story called *The Gift*.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 2:1-13

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

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Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- Why do you think God used these symbols?

- In the first few verses of our story, Luke uses words like *all, each of them, everyone*. What do you think Luke is trying to communicate with this emphasis?
- This story is the original gift of speaking in tongues. What do you see this story teaching us about the original purpose and reasons for speaking in tongues?
- Let's read a verse from two weeks ago, Acts 1:8. How do you think the apostles felt when they realized that, in today's story, Jesus was including all the believers in the gospel commission?

Sharing Questions (50% of your study time):

- A. On a personal note, has anyone ever heard about or personally experienced this *original* type of speaking in tongues like we see in today's story?
- Speaking in tongues is only one of the give
- B. Speaking in tongues is only one of the gifts of the Spirit. What are some of the other ways you see God using those in this circle to be a blessing to others?

- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?

Message of Hope: Anyone who calls upon the name of the Lord and follows Him, will be saved.

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Children's Check-In Questions: How did you help Mommy or Daddy this week? (Or they can answer the adult questions.)

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- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): What are you usually doing at nine o'clock in the morning?

Bridge: Today's story is a sermon presented by Peter where he clarifies three topics that were misunderstood. 1) The topic of drunkenness. 2) The topic of how salvation happens in a person's life, and 3) the topic of death. The miracle part of this story is the last verse, where it says that three thousand people believed, were baptized, and added to the church. So, let's dig into our story which is called *The Promise, part 1*.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 2:14-41

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- Peter starts his presentation by showing that it was impossible for people to be drunk. To quickly review what happened in last week's story, why does Peter start with this unlikely topic?
- 2. Someone read verse 17 and verse 21 again. What do you think these two verses teach us about our relationship with God?

- Dr. Luke summarizes this topic of salvation in verses 37-39. Let's pause and read them again. How would you explain this amazing promise so that a 5-year-old boy would understand it?

- 4. If a modern-day Peter was to preach a similar message how do you think most people would respond today?

- A. On a personal note, how do you respond when people accuse you?
- B. If you had been part of the crowd that listened to Peter, how do you think you might have responded?

- D. Remember: **Anyone who calls upon the name of the Lord and follows Him will be saved**. How can this group pray for you this week?

Group Prayer:

• Put **Empty Chairs** in the middle of your circle. Pray for people who will be invited. **Lunch: Taco Salad sign-up list.**

The Promise, part 2

Acts 2:14-41

Message of Hope: Accepting Jesus as boss of our life and the source of eternal life is our only hope.

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Children's Check-In Questions: How did you help Mommy or Daddy this week? (Or they can answer the adult questions.)

The Quiz: A child asks three questions. They randomly choose from the check-in questions people just answered. Ask everyone to raise their hands and the child picks someone to answer the questions.

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- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): Who is the best boss you have ever worked for?

Bridge: Today's story has two parts. Last week we focused on the first part and today we will focus on the second part. Peter clarifies some often confusing and misunderstood beliefs. Some of the misunderstood beliefs still exist today, so let's read this story with new eyeglasses.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Using the same verses we read last week, let's read the story again, Acts 2:14-41.

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.) ^{*} ------

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- 1. In verses 25-31 Peter quotes King David in the book of Psalms. What do you think Peter is trying to clarify for his listeners?

- Let's pause and read verses 32-46 again. This is often considered the punchline of Peter's sermon. What do you see as some of the key points Peter is emphasizing in this summary?
- 3. What do you think it means for Jesus to be both Lord and Messiah in a person's life?
- Let's pause and read verse 31-32 in all the different translations. Peter is talking about death. What do you think Peter believes happens when a person dies?

Sharing Questions (50% of your study time):

- A. On a personal note, who was a person that God used to convict you of your need for Christ?
- B. Our story ends with Peter's message of truth piercing their hearts and bringing conviction. This is the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives. What is an area that you sense God is piercing your heart, bringing new truth to light, or a new conviction to your heart?
- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?
- D. Remember: Accepting Jesus as boss of our life and the source of eternal life is our only hope. How can this group pray for you this week?

Group Prayer:

- Put **Empty Chairs** in the middle of your circle. Pray for people who will be invited.
- Close by saying the **Blessing Board** blessing together.

The Birth of the Church

Acts 2:40-47

Message of Hope: God's template for His Church is simple and easily reproduced by common people.

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- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): When is your birthday?

Bridge: Today's story is about one of the most unique births that has ever happened. True to any birth, a lot is packed into a small package. Today's story is a small package with only seven verses, but there is a lot to unpack and explore about this new birth that changed the world. So, let's dig in and see how much we can unpack in a short amount of time.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 2:40-47

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.) *------

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- 1. In verse 42, why do you think Dr. Luke focuses on these four things? [™] ------
- Before writing Acts, Dr. Luke wrote the Gospel of Luke. As these 3,000 people (12,000 including women and children) head home, there is one headline that had happened in Jerusalem that they were talking about. Why do you think this headline was so significant? (see Luke 23:45) ^S≪ ------
- 3. Let's pause and reread verses 41 and 47 in the different translations we have. What similarities and differences do you see?

- 4. What do you think made New Testament house churches so easy for common people to reproduce when they arrived back home?

- A. On a personal note, what part of this story would be challenging for you? [™] ------

A Big Bang

Acts 3:1-11

Message of Hope: Not all miracles are a big bang. God also works in the quiet.

The Basic 8 Simple Church Tools: Collection Box, Connection Card Envelopes, Business Cards, Taco Salad Sign-up Sheet, A variety of extra Bible translations, Child Safety Poster, Blessing Board, Summary Form (which is emailed to the Details Coordinator every Sunday).

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Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): What do you typically do when someone asks you for money?

Bridge: Today's story starts off with someone asking for money. But it turns into a big bang and gets everyone's attention. But as we will discover, not all miracles are a big bang. So, let's read our story.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 3:1-11

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- 1. What are all the different glimpses of faith that are alive and active in this story?
- Let's pause and read the last two verses again. If miracles were more common back then than now, why do you think the people are so amazed and respond the way they do?
- 3. Miracles are wonderful, but what do you see as some of the risks that God takes in performing miracles?

Sharing Questions (50% of your study time):

- A. On a personal note, what are some of the quiet miracles you have seen God do in your life? *
- B. If you were to sit by the Temple gate, what would you hope to be healed of? ^{*} ------
- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?
- D. Remember: Not all miracles are a big bang. God also works in the quiet. How can this group pray for you this week?

Group Prayer:

- Put **Empty Chairs** in the middle of your circle. Pray for people who will be invited.
- Close by saying the **Blessing Board** blessing together.

Lunch: Taco Salad sign-up list.

Times of Refreshing

Acts 3:12-26

Message of Hope: God promises a time of refreshing when we turn from sin and follow truth.

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Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): What is something that refreshes you?

Bridge: Today's story cuts right to the point. People often claim ignorance for all kinds of things. In today's story, Peter even gives people the benefit of the doubt and assumes they were ignorant. But then he educates them and calls them to repent of their sin, accept new truth, and live life differently. Today's story is called *Times of Refreshing*.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 3:12-26

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- 1. After people's attention had been captured by the miracle, what verses do you think highlight the new truths that Peter is speaking about?

- Verse 17 is an interesting verse. Let's pause and read it again. At what point in this story do you think "ignorance" becomes "responsibility"?

- 3. Let's pause and read verses 20-23 again. Why does God use prophets to lead people and why do people typically reject what they say?

4. Peter gives his listeners a conditional promise in verse 19-20. Let's pause and read these verses again. What is the promise and what are the conditions?

- D. Remember: God promises a time of refreshing when we turn from sin and follow truth. How can this group pray for you this week?

Group Prayer:

- Put **Empty Chairs** in the middle of your circle. Pray for people who will be invited.
- Close by saying the **Blessing Board** blessing together.
- Lunch: Taco Salad sign-up list.

Ordinary People

outline Acts 4:1-1-22

Message of Hope: God uses ordinary lay people to build His church.

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Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): In one or two words, what is something that deeply disturbs you or amazes you?

Bridge: In today's story church leaders are both disturbed and amazed. As we read our story, let's pay close attention to what is so disturbing and what is so amazing. Who knows, maybe we will also find ourselves disturbed and amazed by the same thing.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 4:1-22

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.) *------

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):

- 1. Going back to the first three verses of our story, what do you think is the specific reason that Peter and John are arrested and put in jail?

- 2. Today's story is the second time Peter brings up the topic of death in his sermon. Let's pause and read verse 2 again, and let's also read 2:31-34. What is so disturbing about Peter and John's teaching about death?

3. In verses 7-12 again, Peter responds to their question. What do you think is so powerful and convicting about Peter's response?

Let's pause and read verses 18-21 one more time. Why do you think Peter and John are so convicted that it is more important to obey God than human leaders?

- A. On a personal note, have you ever been threatened by someone for believing and obeying God's Word?
- B. If you had been one of the church leaders who believed what Peter and John were teaching, what do you think you would have done?

- D. Remember: God uses ordinary lay people to build His church. How can this group pray for you this week?

Group Prayer: Lunch: Taco Salad sign-up list.

Interdependent

outline Acts 4:23-31

Message of Hope: We need each other.

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Kick-off Question (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle): What is one way you are dependent upon others?

Bridge: Today's story gives us a picture of the benefits of being connected with a body of believers who are seeking Truth—Truth with a capital *T*. Everyone starts out in life dependent upon others. Western values encourage people to become "independent." But God's values call us to become "interdependent"—to work together, which is hard work and refines our characters for Heaven.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Acts 4:23-31

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions (50% of your study time):
