Purpose of Study

>To design a culturally sensitive tool to measure marital dissatisfaction among Nigerians living in North America (NINA)

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

- Conflicts have increased among Nigerian immigrants as they become adjusted to living in the U.S.
- There are clashes of the traditional family structures and American culture.
- >External issues have led to arguments, violence, and other disruptions.

Project Plan

- ➤ Mixed method design
- > Factors causing marital disruption -Qualitative approach - Personal Interviews -11 subjects
- ➤ Initial tool (IMDQ) development from qualitative data, literature review
- Pilot testing and factor analysis
- ➤ Tool refinement
- ➤ Questionnaire Revision
- ➤ Tool validation

Inclusion Criteria

- >A Nigerian by birth
- ➤ Married to a Nigerian
- >Still married, divorced, separated or widowed.
- >Living in North America for a period of one year or more.

Exclusion Criteria

- ➤ Married less than one year
- ➤ Living in North America for less than one year

Data Analysis

- Descriptive statistics for demographics
- Thematic analysis of qualitative Data.
- Factor Analysis for the developed questionnaire - . Immigrant Marital Dissatisfaction Questionnaire (IMDQ)

Demographics (n=169)

- ❖ Females were 51%,
- ❖ Over one third (36.7%) of respondents were between ages 41 and 50.
- ❖ 76% were married and living with their spouses
- Average years of marriage was 16.3 years (SD = 10.6)
- One third (33.3%) of the participants were married for more than 20 years.
- ❖ Over half (58.1%) were married in Nigeria
- ❖ 30% migrated to the US before their spouse.
- Primary reason for immigration was education (41.3%)

Results – Thematic Analysis

Identified factors causing marital disruption

- Male verse female role issues
- Cultural issues and Disparities in cultural expectations
- Financial instability
- Job pressure
- Unresolved conflicts (suffering in silence)
- Domestic violence (emotional and/or physical pain
- ❖ In-laws
