Title of Preconference Workshop: Aligning Emergency Operation Centres (EOC) to one health approach in Epidemic Preparedness and Response (EPR)- Country Experiences

Background: The WHO framework of Health Emergency Response and Resilience is based on 5 pillars (5 Cs) namely Collaborative Surveillance, Community Protection, Safe and Scalable Clinical Care, Access to Countermeasures, and Emergency Coordination. Major causes of public health emergencies (PHEs) are as a result of zoonotic spillovers and emerging infectious diseases are mainly of animal origin. Climate change has exacerbated the rate and scale of PHEs. The response needs socio-culturally sensitive and cost-efficient approaches. Preparedness and effective response to events, threats, and vulnerabilities will require effective multidisciplinary and multisectoral collaboration and coordination. Evidence has shown that Incident Management System (IMS) through Public Health Emergency Operation Centres (PHEOC) is effective in ensuring coordination, transparency, and accountability in response to PHEs. There is a need to increase capacity and collaboration across various sectors to ensure better data for evidence-based public health decision-making in the health emergency space.

Global Implementation Solutions (GIS) in partnership with Georgetown University's Center for Global Health Science and Security (GU-CGHSS), and the Center for Health Security at Johns Hopkins University (JHU), through the support of the U.S. Department of State's Nonproliferation and Disarmament Fund (NDF) and AFENET have worked collaboratively in a number of countries to build capacity and collaboration using the One Health approach. GIS has supported countries in Public Health Emergency Management (PHEM) training, establishing PHEOCs, laboratory strengthening and networking, biosecurity /biosafety strengthening, zoonotic disease prioritization, development of one health strategic plans, development of priority zoonotic disease contingency plans, development of one health communication plans and hosting of One Health conferences to foster experience sharing. Since its inception in 2005, AFENET has supported Field Epidemiology Training Programs (FETP) training in 38 African countries using a One Health approach. Graduates from these programs are increasingly taking over leadership and management of PHEOC and other event-specific emergency operations centres (EOCs) in their countries during outbreaks/public health emergencies. Sensitizing them and other conference attendees on the adoption of the One Health approach in the EOC operationalization will further capacitate them to better operationalize and manage multi-sectoral EOCs that effectively and holistically respond to health emergencies. This workshop will harness real-world experiences from a range of countries to foster knowledge-sharing and collaboration among professionals and experts engaged in emergency preparedness and response, with a specific focus on the One Health approach. The workshop will delve into effective strategies for seamlessly integrating considerations related to human, animal, and environmental health into EOCs.

Workshop Objective: The primary goal is to augment the efficiency and efficacy of emergency response efforts by enhancing the One Health approach in Public Health Emergency Operation Centres (PHEOCs). Throughout the workshop, we will underscore the critical importance of the One Health approach, which not only acknowledges the interconnectedness of human, animal, and environmental health but also the inclusion and integration of other relevant sectors in emergency response such as border, security and military.

- 1. Update participants on One Health and PHEOC concepts
- 2. Share country experiences in One Health and PHEOC
- 3. Discuss the rationale of enhancing one health approach in EOC
- 4. Identify specific gaps and suggest solutions for ensuring EOCs are more One Health-responsive
